

The fight to gain back the normalcy in my life has been a challenge. Through the spirit and love from and for my daughters I am able to approach each day with a renewed energy and drive to finding a career that will allow me to live a sustainable and self sufficient lifestyle.

As a single African American male who once had sole custody of my daughters and now fighting to get them back I have found it very unfortunate that there are not many services available for single fathers who are either fighting for custody or to keep custody of their children. Finding adequate employment to support my children and be able to pay child support after losing custody on a technicality has been difficult mentally and emotionally. Much of my struggles came from lack of knowledge of the systems in which I and many others interact with on a daily basis. The Office of Community Wealth Building has helped me not only find employment it has helped me make more informed decisions as a single father seeking custody of my girls.

Thanks to the staff in the Center for Workforce Innovation I feel I am on the right path to ensure that once I regain total stability, I will be able to maintain that stability. Me stepping foot in the Center for Workforce Innovation was the best thing that ever happened to me. Before I walked into that center every turn I made it seemed like there was a shut door!

Interviewer: What is the American Dream to you?

Kiocia: I am more of a family person so I like to do things together. I watched a lot of movies as a child but when I grew up I saw that those things on TV, didn't fit my story. It doesn't show the real struggle of people and how they got to the successful places they've gotten to.

My goal is to first have a good area and community that loves my children just as much as me and helps me find good resources like schools and supplies. In the area that I live in, my daughter's school even has trouble supplying schools supplies to the children. The school asks parents to help, we do our best but when you are living in an area of poverty it is difficult We do the best that we can because we all want the best education possible for our children but its just hard. That is the number one thing that I instill in my children because they follow what they see. That is why I am trying to further my education by going to J. Seargent Reynolds Community College. I want them to want to go to school and say this is what my mother instilled in me.

Interviewer: Have you always believed in the American Dream?

Kiocia: When I was a child I wanted to be a lawyer. I didn't really know what a lawyer was at the time I just knew they were supposed to care about their people and I love anything that cares about people. For example, now I am going to school for Human Services. Growing up I have been through a lot of abuse so over time I was forced to grow up fast at an early age. I had to make a lot of sacrifices over the course of my life. Through all of my struggles I started to understand that even if I took all that time, money and energy to be a lawyer I would end up in debt and still probably not land that dream job I wanted.

When you come up in poverty you cant take the same route as someone who "has". I was just never the person who let my situation determine where i wanted to go. I was growing up in so much disruption and corruption that could've changed my whole dream of going to school. I didn't want to end up dead or in jail and I don't want that for my children. I will never stop trying to reach my dream. So I continue to push for better!

Interviewer: What do you want your future to look like?

Kiocia: I want to be able to get my family out of poverty. Whether its starting with my generation and next generation but to instill values of education and security and loving your family members and community. loving your family. I don't wan my family to have to indulge or be a part of any negativity.

My goal is to get them out of poverty, get them a good education and leave them property to be able to raise their kids in. I plan on raising a successful family and to keep that momentum going! I will break the cycle of generational poverty in our family!



I took a deferred enrollment upon being accepted into law school so that I could save money. During that time I found employment in a workforce development center and realized it was always where I was supposed to be because I love helping people.

If the work that I do can change someone's life, then that is what I want to do!



The people we interact with everyday, I feel, in many cases are those who have been purposely left behind, forgotten or placed in systems where day after day their wheels turn trying to find a way out of their situation. I see people who really want to make a difference in their lives, but haven't been given an equal set of tools and resources to accomplish that.

Through the office of Community Wealth Building we focus on helping people find and use those tools to help get to the next level of self-sufficiency in their life.

I provide an outlet for people's stories to be told and to be heard with the hope that it will help others navigate through their situations.

WE WANT OUR PARTICIPANTS TO HAVE A HIGHER LEVEL OF OPPORTUNITY AND CHANCES FOR SUCCESS



The Center for Workforce Innovation (CWI) is working to expand and improve employment pathways. CWI prepares participants in their pursuit to obtain and maintain well-paying sustainable employment with training support, and connects them with local employers.



Business enterprises whether non-profit, employee-owned or privately owned, that are deliberately structured and operates to create a social good. The specific designated social and economic good for Richmond's social enterprise program, is to reduce poverty by creating and circulating wealth in low-income communities.



Recognizing that there are multiple barriers to achieving self-sufficiency beyond just employment, CWI, in collaboration with OCWB, launched a new program called BLISS, which provides wrap-around holistic support services to targeted participants who are heads of household. BLISS helps participants identify and overcome barriers to success, and addresses the comprehensive needs of participating households. Ultimately, the program is designed to help families take the long-term steps necessary to escape poverty and achieve self-sufficiency.

A long-term, lasting solution to poverty must be anchored in an economic development strategy that generates jobs. The Office of Community Wealth Building (OCWB) is working to expand and improve the way in which residents are connected to local employers, and supports programs which provides training and development to participants striving to obtain and maintain well- paying, sustainable occupations.


Four BLISS participants improved their housing situation (Moved out of RRHA to home ownership
