L&A WITH CHRISTIAN JAVINS

Christian Javins, the recently promoted Head of Technology and Security, and his team of ten started Logic and Accuracy Testing, or L&A Testing, this past week before the first day of Early Voting for the March Primary.

Virginia law states that the general registrar of each locality must do an L&A Testing before each election to ensure that the voting system is working securely, consistently, and accurately.

Javins and his team tested Ballot Marking Devices, or BMD, which are Express Vote machines that voters use to cast their vote during Early Voting. The Express Vote machines were brought in 2015 to reduce waste of ballots and to make voting more accessible to voters with disabilities.

The technology team first loads sample ballots onto the screen and looks for accuracy of the candidates listed, contest, and touchscreen's precision. Then, the team prints out the sample ballot to make sure that it matches the on-screen selections. The process is repeated to generate "a set of predefined test ballots" for each precinct's Express Vote machine.

"If there are any inconsistencies, the team removes the faulty machine and replaces it with one that works properly," Javins said. After the sample ballot is printed from the Express Vote machine, it is inserted in the vote count machine that scans the ballot. Every precinct in the City of Richmond is using voting machine the DS300 to scan the ballots.



To test the DS300, the technology team inserts predefined test ballots into the scanner to check for any issues such as smudged ballots or tears. The team records any identified issues for further review. In the last step, the team tabulates the results from the predefined test ballots and compares it to expected outcomes to confirm accuracy.

Registrar Balmer said the Tabulation System is "the heart of our voting process." Each voting machine has a removable media that tallies all the votes. The removable media, which is a secured USB drive, goes into the central tabulation system that accurately adds up the vote counts.

The technology team also tested the DS450, a vote count machine similar to the DS300, but can process ballots much faster.

The Electoral Board of City of Richmond officially certified the L&A Testing on Jan. 17.
