# Timeline and Highlight of Events

### **JANUARY**

The 113th BRC graduates 16 commissioned officers.

### **FEBRUARY**

Inspection of 100 taxi cabs garners praise from owners and cab companies on the professionalism displayed by police inspectors Sergeant Coretta Monts and Officer Alice Snell.

K-9 Niko passes away due to illness.

### **MARCH**

The *Blue Line Times* premiers *The Civilian Corner*, a segment designed to spotlight dynamic and resourceful civilian employees who help the Department fulfill its mission.

Parents and students of St. Catherine's School start a fundraiser for a new Mounted Unit animal barn.

### **APRIL**

Four town hall meetings are conducted at various locations to get public input on how citizens can help in our mission.

RPD officers test a new MDC unit to be installed in police vehicles.

Citizens and RPD officers participate in Richmond Ride 2017 in support of the Mounted Unit.

### MAY

Over 20 members of the RPD join the pedal pilgrimage to Washington, D.C. in the annual Bike for the Blue Memorial Ride honoring fallen officers.

A RPD officer fatally shoots the driver of a vehicle during a traffic stop. An investigation is on-going.

Virginia State Special Agent Michael T. Walter is slain in a Richmond public housing community by a passenger during a vehicle traffic stop while on joint patrol with a RPD officer.

### JUNE

The 114th Basic Recruit Class graduates 18 new officers: five females and 13 males.

Public Safety 5K Bike Ride community day staff gives away free bikes to the first 100 registered students.

### JULY

Friends of Richmond K-9 hold a family-friendly 'Yappy Hour' social that includes a raffle, merchandise and K-9 pals.

Chief Durham delivers a mid-year report to the community presenting crime statistics and outlining successes and challenges.

### **AUGUST**

National Night Out celebration in Richmond is a huge success with over 100 participating groups.

The Virginia Rules Summer Camp celebrates its fifth year at a new location, Henderson Middle School.

The Shop With A Cop event at Target store reaches 70 students as the community prepares for the school year.

### **SEPTEMBER**

The Department welcomes 21 new officers, members of the 115th Basic Recruit Class.

A small group of protesters and hundreds of counterprotesters converge on statue-lined Monument Avenue without violence. Social media posts are overwhelmingly positive.

### **OCTOBER**

Civilian staff hosts a *Real Men Wear Pink* breast cancer awareness fundraiser and raise nearly \$1,200 benefiting the American Cancer Society.

### **NOVEMBER**

Mounted Officers, riding Scooter and Rio, earn awards including a blue ribbon for first place in Equitation at the North American Police Equestrian Council competition.

The Department investigates a fatal shooting of a juvenile involving an off-duty RPD officer.

### **DECEMBER**

Walmart donates \$25,000 for Friends of the Richmond Mounted Squad fundraising campaign.

Twenty officers and four recruits assist the *Building a Better Richmond* effort by painting, performing groundwork and holiday decorating at Woodville Elementary School.

# DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- RVA League For Safer Streets debuted in July 2017. This community venture was created by former inmates Jawad Abdu and Paul Taylor to promote basketball shots over gun shots in public housing neighborhoods.
- The Department participated in the first-ever Transgender Day of Remembrance in which a tree is planted in memoriam at the Virginia Commonwealth University police station.
- The Fugitive and Firearms initiatives netted 137 firearms seized, 182 felony arrests and 113 felony warrants served.
- Novelist Patricia Cornwell funded a Gunshot Reconstruction class attended by RPD civilian staff and detectives from the Forensic, Homicide and Aggravated Assault units.
- Members of the Mounted Unit, along with Friends of the Mounted Squad, organized several fundraising and community events including the annual Open Barn and the Richmond Ride.
- Increased efforts to reduce and eliminate violent crime included a special concentrated summer Fugitives and Firearms Initiative following the May 2017 slaying of a Virginia State Police Special Agent Michael T. Walter in Mosby Court.
- United States Secret Service Special Agents presented the Department an award in recognition
  of the dedicated work the RPD officers demonstrated during the 2016 election cycle.
- Chief Durham presented Neighborhood Assistance Officers with new upgraded equipment and two brand new vehicles.
- Department officers, civilian staff and volunteers hosted 85 children at the 2017 Virginia Rules camp. Youths especially enjoyed plane rides at Chesterfield Airport and watching the solar eclipse at the Math and Science Innovation Center.
- The Police Training Academy scored one hundred percent standards compliance on a
  Department Of Criminal Justice Services inspection that included the 109th, 110th, 112th and
  113th recruit classes. A truly exceptional feat!
- Richmond Mayor Levar Stoney visited police headquarters to meet personnel and tour the
  facility. With a focus on Central Records, Major Crimes and Forensic units, discussions with staff
  spotlighted the functions of each unit and how dedication and collaboration contributes to
  Department's high clearance rates and safer communities in the city.
- The 115th Basic Recruit Class joined other department members for a four-mile run in the 32nd Law Enforcement Torch Run. Law enforcement agencies raised over 1.3 million dollars benefitting Special Olympics Virginia.
- Between June 26 and August 25, officers across the department volunteered their time with the Summer Food Service Program to feed children in at several Richmond housing communities.
- Officer Juan Tejeda organized and hosted the Miss Hispanidad Virginia Beauty Pageant contest.
   Three area high school students were awarded scholarships.

# **Neighborhood Assistance Officers**



The NAO program is known for its agility and the year 2017 was no exception. NAOs show up where and when needed to augment our uniformed police force. They are at their best when used to assist and manage vehicular or pedestrian traffic at community events. In 2017, NAOs supported over 40 separate engagements including First Friday Arts on Broad Street (11), Motorist Check Points (3) and various high school graduations held at The Siegel Center over 7 days. Fifteen active volunteers donated nearly 1,500 hours on special events support and regular patrol. In patrol, NAOs focus on handling

parking violations, protecting accident scenes and disabled vehicles, locating and removing abandoned vehicles, and other lower priority events. This allows sworn officers to focus on higher priority calls for service requiring their skills and training.

Sadly, NAOs said goodbye to Curtis White, Joyce White and Lyn Jorden-Coker. They had a combined total of 33 years of service.

On a happy note, NAOs received major equipment upgrades. In November, hand-held radios were exchanged for the new APX 6000 model, and in December, NAOs were presented with new vehicles that are specifically equipped with amber lights, directional lighting and the police logo on the doors.



Dispatched calls are handled in a manner that assists those agencies in carrying out their responsibilities.



Celebrating the partnership between police and Richmond Public Schools, **Boys in Blue**, a new mentoring program that pairs students with City of Richmond police officers, kicked off at Swansboro Elementary School.

Mounted Unit worked a total of 36 special assignments requiring officers to be either on foot, truck or horseback. Assignments included marathons, holiday celebrations, parades, youth and community demos.

School Bus Camera Safety is launched in Richmond City Schools using 50 buses. Each bus is equipped with seven cameras that will record drivers who illegally pass school buses when loading and unloading students in Richmond neighborhoods. Camera video footage can assist with investigations by identifying violators.

# Select Initiatives, Campaigns and Collaborative Efforts

The Department teamed again with Target Department stores to participate in **Shop With A Cop**. This national event helps build positive relationships by pairing officers with underprivileged elementary school students. Over 70 children shopped on August 15th and 16th with 70 sworn officers that included the Chief of Police, Deputy Chiefs, Majors, Captains, Lieutenants, Sergeants and Officers handling 35 youths each day. Approximately ten civilian employees volunteered to supervise 10 shoppers each.

support to needy families.

Respect Richmond, a joint city and state antiviolence/retaliation venture was launched in 2017. The initiative is aimed at reducing gun violence and homicides by targeting those at high-risk of committing future gun violence or becoming a victim. The campaign uses ads and messages on social media and gaming systems, along with traditional media.

**Eddie Eagle GunSafe**®, a gun accident prevention program developed to teach children four steps if encountering a gun:

- (1) Stop!
- (2) Don't touch!
- (3) Run away!
- (4) Tell a grown-up if you ever come across a gun.

### **Mosby Initiative**

A thirty-day, June through July, concentrated focus to eliminate gun violence was launched following 19 shootings carried out by June 1, 2017 that included the fatal shooting of Virginia State Special Agent Michael Walter.

Prayer Walk, an endeavor in conjunction with the Department's monthly meeting of faith leaders, brought together close to 70 adults for a nearly three mile walk through high crime-ridden Richmond neighborhoods.

**PalFit** Richmond officers were trained by elite sports performance coaches and met twice weekly to address officer fitness.

coffee With A Cop, a nationally observed event to encourage conversation and open dialog with police in a relaxed environment. Coffee shop owners and citizens look forward to this annual gettogether.

Parinership for Youth Success (PaYS) Program partners the Richmond Police Department and the U.S. Army to recruit and provide job opportunities within the Department for soldiers following completion of their service to this country. A ceremonial signing was held at the National Night Out kickoff event.

**Partnership for Families** encouraged parents to get involved in conversations with other parents and talk openly about their parenting experiences, difficulties they face, managing responsibilities and navigating some of the more challenging situations in raising children.

### The B.R.I.D.G.E.

### **Building Relationships Intentionally Developing Greater Excellence**

A RPD partnership with Bishop Clay S. Cofield of the Spirit of Fire Cathedral to advance conversations on ways to strengthen relationships between law enforcement and the community. The initial series featured food vendors, dance team competitions, hair and fashion show and a performance by recording artist Ernest Pugh.

### **Places of Worship Safety & Awareness Forum**

Focus on raising awareness of the unique challenges and basic preventative measures in religious gathering places. To help mitigate crime, topics included: Emergency Preparedness, Violence in Places of Worship, Addressing the Potential Threats in Places of Worship, and Congregation Safety for Places of Worship.

**IF Project** A joint re-entry initiative between the Richmond Police Department and the Richmond Sheriff's Department based on the Seattle Police Department's "IF Project." Movie producer Kathlyn Horan and Seattle Police Detectives spoke with inmates at the Richmond Justice Center about the program and stakeholders met to discuss implementing the program in Richmond.

Fugitives and Fireams - Summer initiative focusing on reducing violent crime in the city resulted in the confiscation of over 130 illegal firearms and nearly 300 arrest warrants served. This joint effort between the Department and the Virginia State Police played a major role in reducing violent crime during the time period. Between June 1 and September 6, the City experienced an 8 percent reduction in violent crime and a 7 percent reduction in overall crime.

**Sector 411 Operations** After receiving citizen complains regarding drug dealing on Northside Avenue, a surveillance vehicle was parked and netted drugs, drug paraphernalia, firearms, warrants served and arrests in Gilpin Court and Ann Hardy Park. A two-day cross-sector operation with Sector 113 yielded \$2,140, drugs, firearms, eight felony and three misdemeanor arrests.

### Healing through Giving

Following a tragic week in which a double murdersuicide had a direct impact on several children, Sector 113 came together to support their grieving community. Following a neighborhood walk in Creighton Court, officers delivered new clothes, toys, stuffed animals, shoes, books and more. All of the items were purchased with their own resources. Community volunteers noted how lucky they are to have the men and women of Sector

# **House and Business Watch Program**

A free service offered by the Department to year-round residents to "keep an eye on" their homes, and businesses, during the summer while they are away. The home and business vacation watch service is an excellent way to assist residents and business owners when they are away for an extended period of time. This can help protect property and provide peace of mind. Vacation Watch Request forms are provided on the Department's web page.

### **Partnership For Families**

Parents of LIFE program participants got involved and were encouraged to discuss difficulties and responsibilities, and learn tips for navigating challenging situations.

Fourth Precinct conducted several drives: Schedule Change A change in staffing levels (three Sergeants per shift) allowed for better coverage during peak CFS volumes resulting in decreases in overtime. 28 Doors in 28 Days - Sector lieutenants contacted home and business owners in a proactive effort to discuss crime trends and identify community issues. Intervention Teams - Implementation of twoperson Intervention Teams in the Gilpin Court community. Each Fourth Precinct sector established a two-person evening patrol unit to serve as a Quick Response Team. Violent Offender - A joint effort between the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives and Fourth Precinct's Focus Mission Tactical Team (FMT) resulted in a reduction in Violent Crime (-10%), Property Crime (-5%) and Major Crime (-7%).


