New Traffic Signal at South Addison and West Cary streets Installed to Improve Safety

~Signal temporarily flashing red and yellow~

RICHMOND, Va. – A section of the Cary Street Corridor is safer for motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists now that a new traffic signal has been installed.

The signal is at the intersection of South Addison Street and West Cary Street. It will be energized on Friday, September 20 and temporarily placed in flash mode. Those approaching from South Addison Street will see a red indicator, while those approaching the intersection from West Cary Street will see an amber light.

The temporary flashing gives motorists an opportunity to adjust to the new signal ahead of it being set to function as a fully signalized intersection on Thursday, September 26.

The signal was implemented following a traffic study that indicated enough federally required conditions were met to warrant a traffic control device.
