

Flood Season is Here: Know and Reduce Your Risk

Whenever there is rain, there is an opportunity for flooding, even if you live in a lower risk zone. Citizens are encouraged to know your risk, reduce your risk and insure your property.

Know Your Risk -

Learn more about your property's flood risk, the type of flood zone it is in and, if available, the potential flood elevation (also known as the base flood elevation). For this information check out FEMA's online Flood Map Service Center at msc.fema.gov/portal/.

Flood map changes are coming to

our community. Learn about the proposed changes from the last Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) at https://arcg.is/1XOmjj. Reduce Your Risk -

• Elevate and anchor air conditioning condensers, heat pumps, water meters and other service equipment onto pedestals or platforms that are at least 1-foot above the potential flood elevation. In high-risk zones, it's recommended to go above the regulatory flood elevation for the property. This inexpensive action can help prevent significant equipment damage and utility disruption following a flood event.

• Clean out gutters and downspouts so rainwater from your roof can easily flow from your home. Make sure all nearby storm drains are clear of debris and properly functioning.

• Install a rain barrel. A rain barrel is an alternative method for collecting rainwater. Rain barrels are typically connected to gutter downspouts and collect the runoff from roofs. You can use this stored water for watering your lawn and gardens or washing your car.

 Reduce impervious surfaces around the home. Water runs off concrete and asphalt almost immediately and then travels directly into our drainage system. During heavy rains the capacity of storm sewers fills quickly, so retaining and creating natural green space around your home can reduce stormwater runoff and help reduce sewer volume. Consider adding rain gardens or permeable pavements to your homes to allow more water to be absorbed by the ground.

Insure Your Property -

Whether you own or rent your home/apartment/non-residential building, it is critical to protect yourself and your loved ones from property loss and structural damages caused by flooding. Flood insurance is a separate policy that can cover buildings, the contents of a building, or both. To purchase flood insurance, you can start by calling your home or auto insurance company or insurance agent.

DID YOU KNOW?

The City of Richmond participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, which means all citizens are eligible for flood insurance, even if they don't live in a high-risk flood zone. As a Community Rating System community, citizens are eligible for a discount on their premium. If you need help finding a provider, visit floodsmart.gov/flood-insurance-provider or call the NFIP at 877-336-2627. There is typically a 30-day waiting period before the policy goes into effect, so do not wait until there's flood risk.

Stay Updated On Utility Projects

Updating and maintaining the City's aging infrastructure requires continuous utility projects. While necessary and often times critical, these projects can detour routes, delay traffic, increase noise/activity in the area and bring about other disruptions. Five Spring Outdoor Water Conservation Tips

1. When using a hose, control the flow with an automatic shut-off nozzle. 2. Test soil for nutrient content. Add organic matter if needed to absorb and improve water retention. 3. Inspect irrigation systems for leaks, or broken or clogged sprinkler heads. 4. Leave your grass height at about 3 inches. It'll hold moisture better and reduce evaporation. 5. Use a broom rather than a hose to clean off patios, sidewalks, driveways, etc.
