

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

Richard G. Edwards



At the Richmond Police Department, our vision, mission and core values are at the center of everything we do. How we see ourselves, what we are charged to do, how we do it, and the integrity we place on the execution of our duties affects us in ways that often have both immediate as well as long-term outcomes. When I accepted the position as Chief of Police, one of my main priorities became uplifting our sworn and civilian staff to affect positive outcomes. To be most effective, there had to be a focus on employee health, wellness and morale that correlates with our professional responsibilities. One of the programs we've implemented is a wellness workshop to give staff valuable training on managing stress and maintaining wellbeing. To establish a more powerful voice in negotiations, the Department joined the Richmond Coalition of Police, an independent union. The Civilian Wellness team sprang into action with a host of activities and Civilian Appreciation Days have been developed. We've also hired a full-time clinician to offer professional support with a focus on stress management, traumatic events, effective communication and conflict resolution. At the core of these strategies is our commitment to establishing a strong workforce and effectively serve the city of Richmond with integrity, compassion, accountability, respect and equity.

As our community has prospered, so have the challenges associated with safeguarding lives and property within Richmond. In 2023, there was a seven percent reduction in violent crime; from 1,095 in 2022 down to 1,018. Too many of those incidents involved gun violence. It remains a health crisis and continues to plague Richmond. While our gun buybacks are successful and we seize illegal weapons off the streets almost daily, we recognize the imperative nature of a solution. To that end, we are currently developing an aggressive strategic plan with a focus on gun violence reduction. With this roadmap, we aim to utilize data more strategically, target deployments more efficiently and include the voices of community stakeholders. We are confident that with this plan we can reach our goals, have a positive effect on crime and gun violence, and maintain an increasingly satisfied staff and highly effective workforce.

I hope that you enjoy our 2023 Annual Report and thank you for your interest in the Richmond Police Department. Perhaps we can motivate you to become a police officer, civilian professional or volunteer supporter and be a part of something that can positively impact not just this community, but also yourself.





Highlights

Swearing-In Ceremony

On July 24, 2023, Richard "Rick" Edwards was sworn in as Chief of Police. Edwards, a 24 year veteran RPD officer became the 21st Chief of Police for the city of Richmond. Virginia since 1870.

Critical Incident Briefings Release (CIB)

The RPD began sharing with the public video evidence from critical incidents of officer-involved shootings and fatal use of force. The CIB can be accessed via the Department's social media and may include body-worn camera footage, surveillance footage and crime scene footage and other relevant video imagery in an effort to present factual information to the community.

Richmond P.D. Workshop

Seventy-plus police department participants received world-class training and education for officers in high stress environments. The August through October classes covered nutrition and fueling, high stress jobs, sleep and fatigue management. 100% participants believe the program would improve overall health and wellness.

Badges, Faith and Family

In June, the RPD hosted a wellattended worship night gathering at the Police Training Academy. The event was open not only to department members and their families but to the public as well. Music, a devotional message and fellowship was on the agenda with words of encouragement spoken by Officers Paul Cho and TJ Hall.

Car Club - Takeover

A regional team that includes the Richmond Commonwealth Attorney's Office, and Richmond, Henrico, Virginia State, Hanover and VCU police departments working to address pre-planned, advertised and last minute "pop-up" events by car club mobs. The team shares intel, provides investigative follow-up and collaborates on other strategies.

Chat with the Chief

Civilian employees got a chance to speak directly with the Chief to share input on how to better serve the RPD and the city of Richmond. As a result, an employee town hall meeting and quarterly Civilian Appreciate Days will honor our non -sworn staff for their hard work and dedication. Chief Edwards noted that sworn officers cannot effectively do their job without our civilian teammates.

Purchasing Power

During the year, the Department collaborated with Henrico P.D. to replace an older transport airplane. In addition, the RPD has acquired several Polaris ATV and ordered 75 new patrol vehicles with newer styled emergency lights. Another major purchase covered cubicle replacement throughout our headquarters building.

Richmond Coalition of Police (RCOP)

In an effort to continually improve our department, the RCOP officially became the Richmond Police Department's collective bargaining agent and advocate for the welfare of officers. Chief Edwards expressed that he and department members are looking forward to a productive and collaborative working relationship.

Training Tools

The Training Academy operates a virtual reality system which is a new tool that demonstrates realistic scenarios designed to help officers learn how to effectively address real-life situations through virtual role play. The VR system is a tool to help educate the public on officerrelated incidents and situations in which the officer's actions may not be easily understood.

General Orders On-line

On August 31, 2023, 30 police policies went live on the Department's website. A second and third wave was subsequently released. RPD policies govern rules, regulations and standards of day-to-day operations based on local and state laws, best practices and community input.

Real Time Crime Center (RTCC)

The Department received a \$750,000 American Rescue Plan grant which will be used primarily in the operation of the RTCC for hardware (computers, video wall, cameras, license plate readers) and a cloud-based system which can unify live videos from different sources onto a dashboard. The RTCC, aka the Capital City Intelligence Center, is a giant step in technological advancement.

Community Pop-Ups

As part of the gun violence prevention effort, this series plays an integral role in impacting public safety through community engagement. The Pop-Ups merge fun activities with multiple agency information tables which can connect resident to resources. Blue Ridge Estates, Creighton and Elkhardt were three neighborhoods that held outdoor events in 2023.

National Suicide Awareness for Law Enforcement Officers (SAFLEO)

The SAFLEO program has committed to providing training for all department employees. Sessions include: Executive Forum, Leadership and Supervision, Train the Trainer and Line Officer Training.

Social Media

The Department successfully gained social media followers on all platforms and has the potential to achieve a 5% (4,100) or greater growth of social media audiences across all channels. End-of-the-year numbers were as follows:

- Facebook 51.988 followers
- Instagram 8,181 followers
- X (formerly Twitter) 53,788 followers
- YouTube 761 subscribers

In 2023, Public Affairs created 260 posts per channel in addition to releasing 36 external public safety messages and disseminating 240 public safety advisories related to major crime.

LBGTQ+ Liaison

With a new rainbow-themed police vehicle, Captain Kimberly Mooney very visibly and vocally represents the Department's support of the LGBTQ+ community and its commitment to removing biased and discriminatory practices. Captain Mooney represented the Department at the Christmas parade, Metropolitan Community Church Christmas concert and conducted regular zoom meetings with LGBTQ+ community leaders.

Richmond Community Mediators (RCM)


The RCM is an outreach effort with community members formed to break the cycle of violence. Mediators meet with residents who have been impacted by violence and conflict to help them find non-destructive solutions, assist in the aftermath of violence, and instill healthy coping mechanisms to chart a path forward.


Led by Dr. Gwendolyn Andrews, the 3-mediator team is available for any acts of violence or mediation needs. The RCM typically responds to gang activity, domestic violence, shootings and homicides, and home or hospital visitations. In 2023, the RMC served the community for 1,440 total hours.







NEIGHBORHOOD ASSISTANCE OFFICERS

The year 2023 marked a milestone year for the members of the Neighborhood Assistance Officer (NAO) program generating over 1,630 hours of volunteer service. When NAOs were assigned their own vehicles five years ago, they were not equipped with Mobile Data Terminals (MDT). The NAOs were then restricted to radio communications to determine where they could be of assistance. This limited their visibility to a single communications channel. This year, selected NAOs were issued iPhones with special applications giving them full visibility of all calls-for-service. This simple change allowed NAOs to apply their skills where they could provide the greatest benefit. As a corps of civilian volunteers, the NAO program is assigned within the Special Operations Division to Traffic Operations for supervision. Within that structure, last year, they accepted traffic control assignments for community events to include: the Monument Avenue 10K, Fourth of July celebration, Richmond Folk Festival, Richmond Marathon, RVA Illuminates, and the Dominion Energy Christmas Parade. At those events, NAOs could be found controlling traffic, and providing directions and timely information to participants and observers alike.

Traffic safety in all its forms remains a focus of the program. To that end, NAOs give particular attention to parking violations that create hazards such as parking in crosswalks and blocking handicapped zones. In 2023, NAOs issued nearly 600 violations. Improving the quality of neighborhoods, another NAO goal, has resulted in the removal of nearly 200 abandoned vehicles. Furthermore, NAOs have volunteered in meal preparation at events that generate revenue for Police Athletic League events like the Chief's Challenge Golf Tournament and Pull For PAL skeet shoot.

Meeting as a group on the last Thursday of the month, NAOs focus on in-service training and planning for upcoming events. Contact the Special Operations Division for information on how to become a NAO.



Police Volunteers

The most invaluable asset benefiting this agency is the contribution and hours of our police volunteers, i.e. citizens who desire to lend their time and skills to help with special activities, community events and lend assistance to ease the workload of sworn officers.

During 2023, forty-two citizens served as official Richmond Police volunteers at local public events that included Community Fairs, Neighborhood Walks, the Police Athletic League-organized Chief's Golf Challenge, National Night Out, Faith Leaders and Homicide Support Group programs, and R.E.S.E.T. (Rapid Engagement of Support in the Event of Trauma). Our volunteers were also instrumental in assisting the Community, Youth and Intervention Services (CYIS) staff in facilitating crime prevention and community education settings such as church security forums. All police and volunteer activities are performed collaboratively under the supervision of RPD staff as part of our community policing focus on crime reduction strategies in the city of Richmond.

Working alongside CYIS staff, many off-duty civilian staff and sworn officers volunteered in programs and events designed to serve juveniles through youth-oriented activities. Programs such as RVA Reads, Juvenile Justice, Mirror Me, Summer Camp, Law Enforcement Intervention Focusing on Education (LIFE) program and R.V.A. Cooks were quite successful with a waiting list to attend most.

A group of nine clergy members served as volunteer Chaplains for the Department in 2023. The Chaplains responded to over 2,000 calls and critical incidents involving homicides, shootings, malicious woundings, self-harm situations and community and neighborhood conflicts. Chaplains have also visited hospitals, private homes and various suppliant neighborhoods needing and asking for help throughout Richmond.



Developing a budget is a comprehensive approach to addressing the diverse needs of the Richmond Police Department. It embodies an overall dedication to fiscal prudence and strategic investments in personnel, equipment, training and programming. Budget planning is a continuous year-round or multi-year process involving ongoing analysis, prioritization and critical review of staffing, equipment, training, programs and special purchasing needs. Forecasting current and future operational needs is essential to the development of a budget that maintains the level of service that residents expect of the Richmond Police Department.

SPECIAL FUNDS

 \overline{GRANTS} support our ideas and projects designed to stimulate engagement, advance safety and improve policing outcomes in the community. Awarded by federal, state or local agencies, private foundations and corporations, grants often fund other critical initiatives and address areas of concern within specified parameters and the scope of the award in a socially responsible manner. The city of Richmond has approved and adopted the following Fiscal Year 2023 grants for police services:
